Whitney Benefits, Inc. was created under the Last Will and Testament of Mr. Edward A. Whitney, a Sheridan County resident, who passed away in 1917. Under the terms of Mr. Whitney's will, the principal of his estate was to be transferred to the corporation and invested. The net income from the investments was to be used for specific educational purposes.


The original trustees of Whitney's estate said that Whitney spent three decades of his life planning for his gift to the people of the county. He made extensive investigations in the East as to how trust funds were structured for education, they said. The last couple of years of Whitney's life were devoted, in part, to thoughtfully revising again and again his final will. This will established the Whitney Benefits Foundation and carried his substantial legacy of, concern for, and service to, the peoples of Sheridan and Sheridan County onward. Through the foundation, his gift continues to touch and enrich the lives of thousands.

Mr. Whitney's trunk, which was stored at the YMCA for many years, was rediscovered and its contents were revealed in January of 2006. Passports, steamboat and railroad tickets, bank ledgers, receipts from around the world and a buffalo coat were among the findings in the trunk size crate. "Mr. Whitney kept everything", stated Whitney Trustee Mary Ellen McWilliams.

Included in the trunk was an 1886 memorandum of agreement between Whitney and John Loucks, founder of Sheridan, for Whitney to purchase the Mandel Cabin at the intersection of Loucks and Main Street. Purchase price was 40 head of 2-year-old heifers from West Union, Iowa, where Whitney lived before coming to Sheridan. Mary Ellen McWilliams stated that Loucks acquired the Mandel Cabin- reported to be the first building in Sheridan- and moved it to the Main and Loucks location. It was used as a post office and store.

After Whitney acquired the Mandel Cabin, he converted it to the Bank of Sheridan- the town's first bank. Mr. Whitney resided in the living quarters above the bank until his death in 1917.

Whitney Trustees Mary Ellen McWilliams and Sam Street spent hours reading through and sorting the old documents. Whitney Benefits hired an archivist from the University of Wyoming American Heritage Center to assist in sorting through the documents. Everything has been preserved in acid-free containers and clear plastic envelopes.

## **STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM - 4,695 STUDENTS SERVED**

Specifically, Mr. Whitney directed the corporation to create, from its net income, a student loan program that would help provide men and women with modest financial assistance to pursue academic and vocational studies. The program began providing interest free student loans to Sheridan County residents in 1928. Since inception of the program, through June 30, 2006, the corporation has loaned 4,695 students approximately \$20,408,472.87. For the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2006, Whitney approved interest free loans totaling \$2,905,952.28 to 129 students; 85 students received loans for the first time, and 44 students had received loans previously. ## **SHERIDAN COLLEGE - OVER \$22 MILLION GIFTED TO DATE**

In his will, Mr. Whitney specifically suggested the establishment of a college in or near the City of Sheridan, Wyoming from the corporation's net income, after the worth of the corporation exceeded \$1,000,000. Through the vision and generosity of the late Edward A. Whitney, Whitney Benefits has played a pivotal role in establishing the Sheridan College campus and programs. This includes the first gift of land on which the campus is built, which now encompasses 124.11 acres- all gifted by Whitney Benefits. In total, Whitney Benefits' unmatched generosity and unparalleled gifts to Sheridan College amount to over \$22 million.

## **ADAMS RANCH LAND - 560 ACRES**

Whitney Benefits is continuing the no fee lease agreement with Sheridan College on the Whitney owned 560-acre Adams Ranch, located to the south of Sheridan College campus. In turn, Sheridan College subleases the ranch to a local rancher. The income received from the property benefits the Sheridan College agriculture programs. The land is also used for hands-on educational programming and teaching at Sheridan College.

## **GRANTS AND DEVELOPMENT AT SHERIDAN COLLEGE - \$168,999 DEVELOPMENT OFFICE**

In May of 2006, Whitney Benefits gifted the Sheridan College \$168,999 to create a Grants and Development office on campus. The grant will be paid over a period of three years, with the intent that the position will become permanent and self-sustaining. Sheridan College is utilizing the grant to fund a director of grants and development position. The director works closely with the college and Sheridan-area leaders to assess college priorities, community needs and funding opportunities. Susan Bigelow of Sheridan College stated, "Many federal and state economic development grants are designed specifically for schools including community colleges. We simply have to seek them out and apply."

Whitney Benefits Trustee Everett McGlothlin stated, "The Whitney Board is pleased to assist in providing funding for the creation of a Sheridan College Grants and Development office. We are particularly pleased in that this director of grants position will seek additional funding in and outside of the community for collaborative educational program funding."

## **TECHNICAL CENTER UPGRADES - \$46,000 UPGRADE**

In July of 2006, Whitney Benefits gifted the Sheridan College Technical Center \$46,000 to install a direct expansion cooling upgrade to the existing heating and ventilating unit serving the classroom portion of the Technical Center. The new system allows for easier temperature control and helps to make the learning environment better and more conducive by providing a quieter learning space.

The project included the installation of a 'Building Automation Control' unit which will connect to the existing campus building control system. The system also incorporates graphics and higher level control functions for the air handling unit.

## **NURSING ENDOWMENT -**

### **\$1 MILLION, WHITNEY BENEFITS + \$1 MILLION, STATE OF WYOMING = \$2 MILLION ENDOWED CHAIR**

On November 21, 2006, Whitney Benefits presented the Sheridan College Foundation with a \$1 million check for the Edward A. Whitney Endowed Nursing Chair. The creation of the chair will allow Sheridan College to add a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing to the curriculum. The degree can be completed on-site in Sheridan.

Sheridan College President Kevin Drumm stated, "An endowed chair is the pinnacle of achievement for any college. Until today, Wyoming was slated to have the largest nursing shortage in the nation until 2020."

The \$1 million gift will be matched by the State of Wyoming under the Community College Endowment Challenge program. The endowed chairperson will implement the already existing UW online nursing curriculum at Sheridan College and teach select courses each semester in the traditional classroom setting to better meet the needs of the Associate Degree RNs in our community. "We want a top-notch (program) and we know we're going to have it", stated Whitney Benefits President Tom Kinnison at the news conference.

"The reality of having the ability to offer a Bachelor's degree in Nursing at Sheridan College is paramount," SC Dean of Health Sciences, Trudy Munsick stated, "Everyone involved in this project simply wanted to offer the opportunity for students to pursue higher education without leaving the area. Our Nursing Department has a great working relationship with the UW Nursing School and is very excited about taking that relationship to the next level. Thanks to Whitney Benefits, I believe this will open many doors for our students. It is truly a wonderful gift."

## WHITNEY COMMONS - SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

Citizens of the community and visitors alike utilize Whitney Commons as a place to play, relax, gather, reflect or to simply enjoy. The beautiful five-acre park was opened to the public on September 30, 2003. Whitney Benefits privately manages and maintains the park.

Whitney Commons is located in the heart of Sheridan, between the Senior Center, Sheridan County YMCA, and the Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library. Whitney Commons features an amphitheater, interactive water feature, plaza area, the Dorothy King Reflective Garden with a reflective pool, a labyrinth, illuminated

walkways and a universally accessible playground.

In the spring of 2006, the Whitney Community Advisory Group approached SAGE/Club Ed, an after school art program to have their students create art for Whitney Commons. ## SHERIDAN ICE LLC - OVER 30,000 SERVED



Sheridan Ice LLC features a NHL-size outdoor refrigerated ice complex that hosts many recreational and educational events such as figure skating, family skate nights, recreational skate parties, hockey, curling and a variety of other community skating activities. Last season nearly 30,000 people participated in activities that Sheridan Ice LLC offered.

## CONNECTING THE COMMUNITY

Whitney Benefits continues to work in collaboration with the City of Sheridan to connect the Sheridan Community with the current pathway system.

### **Henry A. Burgess Bridge - Gifted To The City Of Sheridan**

Whitney Benefits worked in collaboration with the City of Sheridan to place a pedestrian bridge across Goose Creek between Whitney Commons and Kendrick Park. The bridge is placed on the current Sheridan pathway system, and attaches residential neighborhoods and the Sheridan Junior High School to other community and educational centers such as Whitney Commons, Sheridan County YMCA, Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library, Sheridan Senior Center and Kendrick Park.

On November 6, 2006, the bridge was dedicated to Mr. Henry A. Burgess for his commitment to Whitney Benefits and the Sheridan Community. Whitney Benefits would not be the foundation that it is today without Henry's generous dedication. From 1973 to 1995, Henry represented Whitney Benefits in obtaining a settlement from the Department of Interior. The total amount awarded to Whitney Benefits amounted to \$64,000,000, including compounded interest.

The beautiful bridge project features an eight foot sidewalk with decorative lighting leading up to the bridge. The bridge also has a planter for seasonal flowers and vegetation, two statue bases, and an area of decorative pavers matching the walk ways at Whitney Commons.

Whitney Benefits gifted the bridge to the City of Sheridan at the November 6, 2006 ceremony. The City used Whitney's funding for the bridge to obtain a matching TEAL grant to place pathways to the bridge from Whitney Commons through Kendrick Park.

### **Whitney Commons Pathway Extension - Whitney Commons**

Whitney Benefits extended Whitney Commons to the northeast by constructing a pathway from Whitney Commons to the corner of Alger and Brooks. The newly constructed pathway features pedestrian lighting, a statue base with decorative pavers, a decorative retaining wall separating the 290 N. Brooks building from the pathway, and security cameras. The project incorporates many native trees, shrubs and plants and continues to connect the community with downtown Sheridan.

Whitney Benefits has granted the City of Sheridan an easement along the sidewalk to incorporate in the City of Sheridan Pathway Master Plan.

# WHITNEY BENEFITS INVESTING IN THE COMMUNITY



## WHITNEY PLAZA - UNIQUE DOWNTOWN SHERIDAN DEVELOPMENT

Whitney Benefits' property holding company, EAW, Inc. began construction of the Whitney Plaza PUD, located just east of downtown Sheridan on the historic parade grounds, between Grinnell Avenue and Brundage Street, fall of 2005.

Whitney Plaza is a unique development that will combine retail, office, live/work and residential uses, all within a downtown setting. The buildings in Whitney Plaza will be designed to reflect Historic Downtown Main Street and the Historic Railroad District, with the Sheridan County School District Administration building as the anchor. Whitney Plaza boasts many attractive features including a public square themed to embrace the Big Horn Mountains, pocket parks, pedestrian trail access and hundreds of parking spaces to accommodate the development and the community.

After evaluating many uses for this property and gathering input from hundreds of residents of the community, EAW, Inc. planned to construct Whitney Plaza PUD to enhance the downtown community. Whitney Plaza PUD will strengthen the job base,

supports the businesses downtown growth, returns the School District to the downtown as the new cornerstone, and has the potential to add significant housing opportunities within the downtown area. All proceeds from this development go back to the community through Whitney's continued philanthropic educational funding.

EAW, Inc. is pleased to announce the Sheridan County School District Administration building as the cornerstone of Whitney Plaza. The building, located on the corner of Grinnell and Connor Street, was complete and occupied October 2006. EAW, Inc. owns a portion of the building and leases the space to a local company.

Construction on Phase I of the development is scheduled to be complete January 2007. This includes Grinnell Square which features street designs consistent with Grinnell Plaza. The two blocks are designed to be closed off at alley accesses from Grinnell and Connor for special occasions. The square also features a platform area perfect for public speakers or entertainment, attractive lighting and benches, as well as decorative concrete throughout the project. Grinnell Square leads to the Sheridan Pathway system, connecting Whitney Plaza to downtown Sheridan and the Sheridan ice rink.


EAW, Inc. will begin installing the infrastructure early in 2007 on Phase II of the Whitney Plaza project, which includes live/work and residential lots. Live/work lots feature the ability to live and work within the same building on one lot.

Office and commercial uses are allowed from the Whitney Lane side of the property and will feature frontage aspects appealing to a commercial setting. Residential uses are permitted on the Park Lane side, and will feature neighborhood aspects appealing to a new urbanism residential neighborhood. The residential neighborhoods will mimic traditional neighborhood designs consistent with historic Sheridan, Wyoming.

## WHITNEY CENTER - TEN EDUCATIONAL NON PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS SERVED

The Whitney Center, located at 245 Broadway was purchased by Whitney Benefits in 2002. The 27,000 square foot building houses educational non-profit organizations that share the common mission of improving vocational and educational opportunities in the community. The Center allows for the organizations to work side-by-side, sharing resources and improving collaboration among Sheridan nonprofits.

The Whitney Center received exterior renovations Summer of 2006 that included new windows, doors, concrete work, additional lighting, trees, planters, a flagpole, signage, awnings and the Easter Seals horse, "Twilight Trails". The front entrance was updated and the historic "Sheridan Creamery" sign on the 245 Broadway building was uncovered and renovated during the construction. Whitney Benefits plans for interior renovations to make room for additional nonprofit organizations in 2007. Current occupants of the Whitney Center include: A-STOP Computer Center, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Child Care Finder, Club Ed/SAGE, Coordinated School Health Program, Even Start Infant/Toddler, Even Start Preschool, Project Youth, SCOPE, Sheridan Community Educational Foundation, Inc., Whitney Benefits and EAW, Inc. The Whitney Center is managed by the Sheridan Community Educational Foundation, Inc. To assist with the operational costs of the building Whitney pays rent monthly to SCEF. ## SHERIDAN COUNTY FULMER PUBLIC LIBRARY -

### \$133,000 GIFTED FOR EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES

On December 19, 2006, Whitney Benefits gifted the Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library \$133,000 specifically for the renovation and expansion of the library facilities and reading room to further the educational opportunities for the community. Whitney Benefits is funding the grant request of the Sheridan County Library Foundation, in which they were asked to support the capital campaign for the renovation and expansion.

Whitney Benefit's grant intent was that the Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library, in conjunction with the Kiewit and Scott Foundations, use the Whitney grant monies to meet and maximize these organizations' matching challenge pledges. Sam Scott, Whitney Benefits Trustee said, "Whitney Benefits is pleased to encourage and support the Sheridan County Fulmer Public Library capital campaign program with its pledge of \$133,000. Whitney is particularly pleased in that matching community dollars were used by each organization to improve the library and the community."

LuAnn Marks, chair of the Sheridan County Public Library Board of Trustees, explained that the entire project—from parking lot to the new circulation area—was designed with the needs of library patrons as the top priority. The Library Foundation Board worked hard for several years to raise the money needed to complete this project. She stated, "The pledge of \$133,000 from Whitney Benefits took us over the top.
